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A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF REDDY

Welcome to the **2025 Lynn Police Department Annual Report**. This report provides a summary of the many programs, initiatives, and accomplishments achieved over the past year. It is also available online at **www.lynnpolice.org**.

I am honored to serve as Chief of the Lynn Police Department and remain immensely proud of the exceptional work performed each day by the dedicated men and women of this organization. Their commitment to public safety, professionalism, and community service continues to make a meaningful difference throughout the City of Lynn.

Throughout 2025, we made significant progress in strengthening community relationships while enhancing public safety. We achieved an overall **12% reduction in crime**, continuing a positive multi-year trend driven by targeted enforcement, strategic deployment, and strong collaboration with community and public safety partners. We also realized a **15% reduction in firearms-related crime**, building on prior years efforts to address gun violence.

We made significant progress in hiring and retention through innovative recruitment strategies, improving staffing levels and positioning the Department to expand services. In support of our community policing philosophy, we established a dedicated community engagement unit and expanded youth programming, including summer and school vacation programs.

We implemented a Field Training Officer program to better prepare new officers and we secured key grant funding for Mobile Field Force equipment, community camera expansion, and a new drone program. We also expanded Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) and de-escalation training to ensure our officers are well-equipped to respond to complex situations safely and effectively.

Additional initiatives included the introduction of a Motorcycle Patrol Program, expanded traffic enforcement efforts, particularly in school zones, and we became a member of NEMLEC, providing Lynn with valuable regional resources and training opportunities for our officers. We are also planning to expand bicycle patrol capabilities to enhance flexibility and community interaction.

We encourage you to review this report to learn more about these efforts and gain a better understanding of how your police department operates. We value your support and partnership and thank you for your continued confidence in the Lynn Police Department.

LYNN POLICE ADMINISTRATION

Chief Christopher P. Reddy was sworn in as Chief of the Lynn Police Department on May 20, 2021. He began his law enforcement career in 1985 and has served in a variety of leadership roles throughout the department, including the first supervisor of the Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault Unit. He also worked as the Officer in Charge of the Anti-Crime Team, Community Policing and Intelligence Units before returning to the Patrol Division as the Executive Officer on the First Division. After his promotion to Captain in 2009, Chief Reddy served in the Administrative Division before taking command of the Patrol Division in 2010. In that role, he directed all patrol operations, supervised the Traffic and CBD Units, and represented the department on the City of Lynn Emergency Management Committee.



A lifelong Lynn resident, Chief Reddy earned a bachelor's degree from UMass Lowell and a master's degree in Criminal Justice from Anna Maria College. He has completed certificate programs in Executive Leadership sponsored by the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Association (LEEDA) and Police Leadership from Northeastern University. Since becoming Chief, he has completed advanced training from the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar (Session #80) and the LEADS Fellowship Session 5.0.

He is a member of several professional law enforcement organizations, including the International Association of Chiefs of Police, Massachusetts Major City Chiefs of Police, Essex County Chiefs of Police, and the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Association. Chief Reddy also serves on the North Shore Community College Criminal Justice Advisory Board, the ADL New England Law Enforcement Advisory Committee, and is a member of the Lynn Rotary Club.



LYNN POLICE ADMINISTRATION

Deputy Chief Michael Vail has been the Deputy Chief of Administration since his promotion on August 14, 2020. In his administrative role, Deputy Chief Vail works closely with the Captains of Technical Services, Administration and Professional Standards providing operational guidance and direction. Deputy Vail also leads the Lynn Police Department's Wellness Committee which was established in 2025.

Deputy Chief Vail began his career with the department in 1995. As a patrolman, he worked on the Community Liaison Team where he forged relationships with many youth within the city. During this time the city began to experience an increase in gang violence which resulted in the department creating the Gang Unit. Based on his relationships and knowledge of the gang problems within the city, he was an obvious choice to join the Gang Unit. He was promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 2004 and returned to the Patrol Division until he returned to the Gang Unit as a supervisor. After years of working with gangs, Deputy Chief Vail earned the right to testify in court as a gang expert.

Deputy Chief Vail was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant in 2008 and returned to the Patrol Division. After two years, Deputy Vail was assigned to the newly created Youth Services Unit. He became the Captain of Professional Standards after he was promoted in 2014. He remained in this role for six years which prepared him for his current role. As a Captain, Deputy Vail was instrumental in writing grants, which helps secure both federal and state funding for the department. He was also responsible for overseeing the hiring process for all new police recruits, which includes performing extensive background checks for all potential candidates, arranging for drug screens, oral boards, psychological tests and physical exams prior to enrolling them into a police academy.

Deputy Chief Vail graduated from the prestigious FBI National Academy in 2017 and was the recipient of the department's 2004 Medal of Honor.





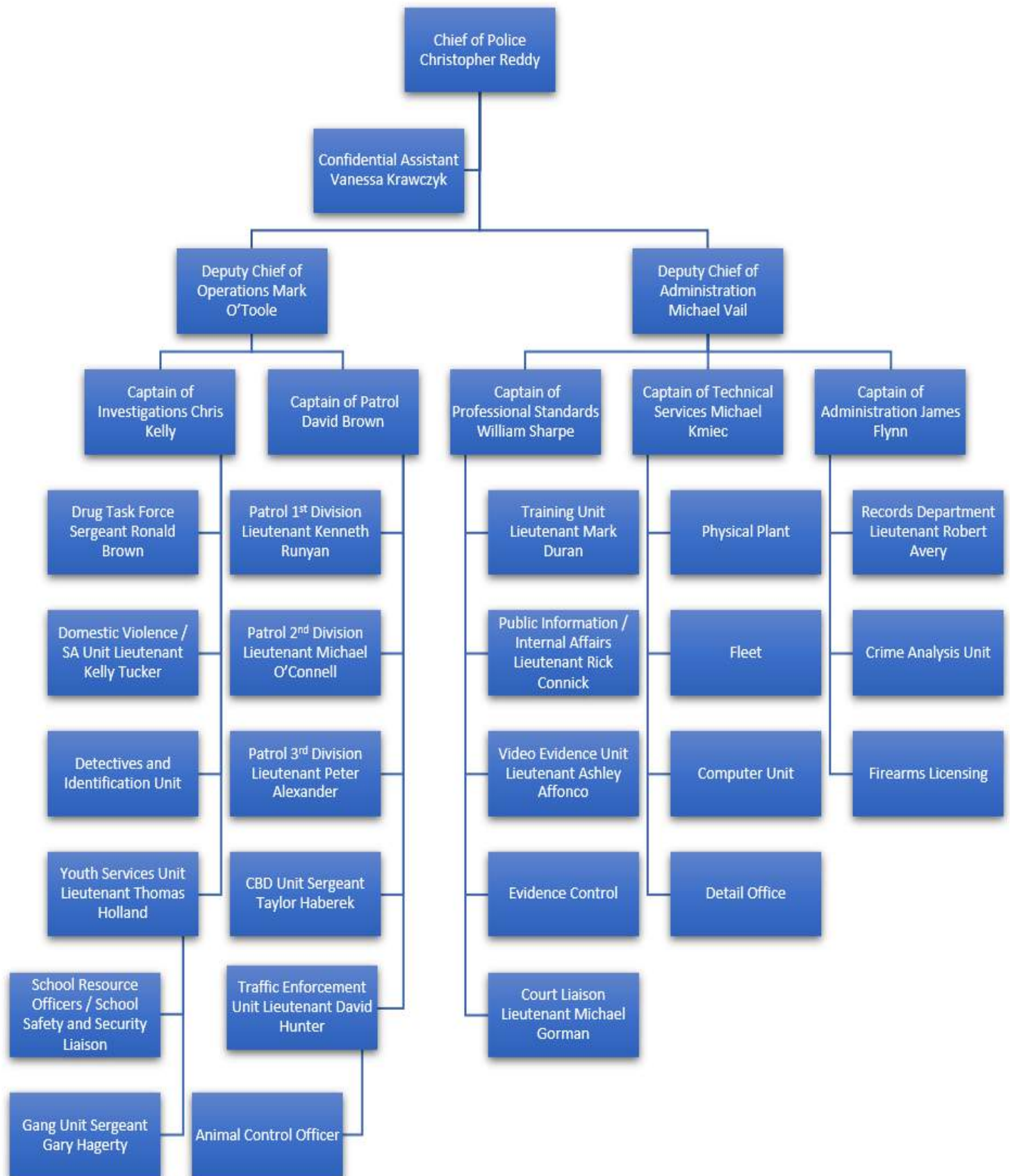
LYNN POLICE ADMINISTRATION



Vanessa Krawczyk joined the department in 2024 and serves as the Confidential Assistant. The Confidential Assistant acts as the Chief's main administrative partner, providing high-level executive support and daily coordination. The role oversees all non-sworn administrative operations, managing staff to keep work organized and running smoothly. Responsibilities include overseeing budget and payroll functions, including purchasing and billing, and supervising a clerical team that supports multiple divisions. By providing strong operational coordination, the Confidential Assistant makes sure the department's systems and processes work well each day.

While we continued hiring via the traditional Civil Service system, a shrinking candidate pool brought on new challenges. A focus on recruitment and hiring proved to be mission essential functions to ensure continuity of operations at the Lynn Police Department. We engaged in the Hybrid Hiring Pathway, where we contracted with GetBadged.com to hire 50% of our candidates outside of the Civil Service system. This strategy, coupled with a new recruitment campaign, brought on a diverse pool of qualified, eager candidates, ready to serve.

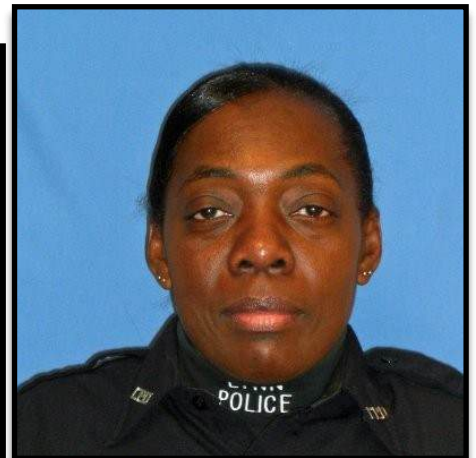

PROMOTIONS

PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division is responsible for responding to 911 emergencies, as well as, routine calls for service. Due to the fact that the Patrol Division handles thousands of calls annually, patrol officers represent the department's most direct interaction with the public. Officers are trained to respond quickly, assess situations effectively, and manage a wide range of incidents in the field. In addition to handling calls, patrol officers complete initial reports related to criminal activity, document suspicious behavior, and often conduct preliminary criminal investigations at the patrol level.



The Patrol Division operates across three shifts: First Division (5 p.m.—1a.m.), Second Division (1 a.m. – 9 a.m.), and Third Division (9 a.m. – 5 p.m.). Each division is supervised by a Lieutenant who reports directly to Captain Brown. There are five Lieutenants and fifteen Sergeants assigned to the Patrol Division.

The department's goal is to maintain a strong presence throughout all neighborhoods, foster positive relationships with residents, prevent and deter crime, and ensure a rapid response whenever assistance is needed.

Captain David Brown served as the Captain in charge of the Patrol Division. As a thirty-year veteran of the department, he oversees Patrol operations as well as the Traffic Unit, the Central Business District Bike Unit, and the Community Engagement program. The Patrol Division serves as the foundation of the department, with the majority of officers assigned to patrol operations.

As the most visible law enforcement presence in the community, patrol officers provide essential police services to the public twenty-four hours a day. The Patrol Division is committed to maintaining a professional, highly trained, and well-educated police force dedicated to delivering the highest level of service and protection to the community.



PATROL DIVISION



Lieutenant Peter Alexander has been with the department for twenty-four years and is the Commanding Officer of the Third Division.

Lieutenant Kenneth Runyan has been with the department for ten years and is the Commanding Officer of the First Division.

PATROL DIVISION

Central Business District Bike Patrol Team

Sergeant Taylor Haberek, a fourteen-year veteran of the department, supervises the **Central Business District (CBD) Bike Patrol Team**. The unit is comprised of Officer Tom Morley, Officer Michael McEachern and Officer Jennifer Almonte.

The CBD Team was established to address quality-of-life concerns and disorder-related issues within the downtown area. Through regular bike patrols and direct community engagement, the unit embraces the principles of community policing by building strong partnerships, fostering communication, and proactively addressing ongoing issues affecting the downtown business district and surrounding neighborhoods.

In the course of their duties, CBD officers frequently identify individuals in need of mental health support, addiction recovery services, and housing assistance. The unit works closely with the department's Behavioral Health Unit to connect these individuals with the appropriate services and help guide them through the process of obtaining assistance.

The CBD Team also works collaboratively with downtown business owners to address chronic and long-term concerns impacting the area. Officers maintain strong partnerships with numerous outside agencies and service providers, including the Lynn Shelter Association, the Department of Mental Health, the Lynn Housing Authority, Lynn Inspectional Services, and Eliot Mental Health Services.



Each month, the unit participates in the Lynn Police Criminal Justice/Mental Health meeting, where officers collaborate with service providers and partner agencies to identify individuals in need of support and develop coordinated strategies for providing assistance. CBD officers also regularly attend community meetings to listen to residents' concerns, identify recurring issues, and organize collaborative responses aimed at improving neighborhood conditions and public safety.



PATROL DIVISION

Traffic Unit



Lieutenant Hunter has served with the department for twenty years. He currently oversees both the **Traffic Unit** and the **Animal Control Officer** position, which was incorporated into the department in 2019. He additionally oversees matters related to the Insurance Fraud Bureau.

Lieutenant Hunter is responsible for handling the majority of citation hearings at Lynn District Court involving both criminal and civil motor vehicle violations. He also manages and processes a significant amount of administrative paperwork associated with traffic enforcement grants worked by department officers.

Reporting directly to Lieutenant Hunter are Detective Michael Eddows and Animal Control Officer John Plourde. Together, they support the department's efforts

to promote traffic safety, investigate motor vehicle accidents, enforce traffic laws, and address animal control issues within the community.

Detective Michael Eddows has been with the department for 27 years and he is currently assigned as a Traffic Investigator. Det. Eddows focuses traffic enforcement in areas with historically high numbers of accidents, he investigates traffic related crime and he is a certified Drug Recognition expert which assists him in identifying drivers under the influence of narcotics.





PATROL DIVISION

Animal Control Officer

John Plourde is the Animal Control Officer. In 2019 the Animal Control position was transferred under the Lynn Police Department and ACO Plourde maintains his office at the LPD station. ACO Plourde focuses on lost animals, dangerous animal response and animal related crime.



CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) is commanded by Captain Christopher Kelly, a twenty-eight year veteran of the department. Prior to his promotion, Captain Kelly served for many years within CID as a Lieutenant, providing him with extensive investigative experience and allowing for a seamless transition into his current leadership role. During his tenure in CID, he served as the lead investigator in several high-profile homicide cases that resulted in successful convictions. In recognition of his service and dedication, Captain Kelly was awarded the department's Medal of Honor in 2021.

In addition to supervising CID detectives, Captain Kelly oversees several specialized units, including the Drug Task Force, Domestic Violence Unit, Youth Services Unit, Identification Unit, and Gang Unit. He reports directly to Deputy Chief of Operations. Captain Kelly is responsible for reviewing all incoming cases and evaluating them based on various solvability factors to determine whether immediate follow-up by a detective is warranted.

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) serves as the Lynn Police Department's primary investigative unit, responsible for investigating serious crimes affecting the community.

Detectives investigate a wide range of offenses, including violent crimes, firearms offenses, robberies, assaults, property crimes, financial crimes, and death investigations. CID detectives identify offenders, collect evidence, interview witnesses, execute search warrants, and develop cases for prosecution while supporting victims and their families throughout the investigative process. The Division works closely with the Massachusetts State Police Detective Unit assigned to the Essex County District Attorney's Office, the Essex County District Attorney's Office, neighboring law enforcement agencies, and state and federal partners. These partnerships provide access to specialized resources, intelligence, forensic support, and investigative expertise to solve cases and address crime trends. CID also supports crime prevention efforts through information sharing, community partnerships, and collaboration with public safety stakeholders. Through effective investigations and coordinated enforcement efforts, the Criminal Investigation Division continues to enhance public safety and improve the quality of life for the residents of Lynn.

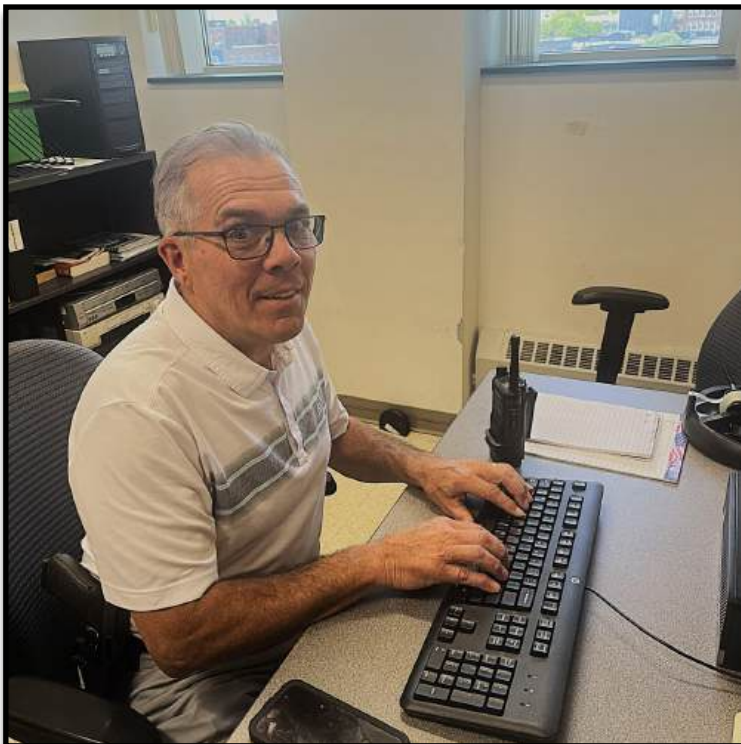


CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION

Detective Joshua Hilton, Detective Lieutenant Timothy Donovan and Detective William Stilwell are assigned to the Criminal Investigation Division. Detective Hilton has twenty years with the department and he has worked in CID for the past five years.

Detective Lieutenant Donovan has twenty-four years with the department and he is the Executive Officer of the Criminal Investigation Division. Additionally, Detective Lieutenant Donovan brings a wealth of investigatory experience as he was previously the Officer in Charge of the Gang Unit and the Youth Services Unit.

Detective Stilwell has fourteen years with the department and over two years with the Criminal Investigation Division. Det. Stilwell gathered investigative expertise from years as a patrolman in the downtown area, as well as, several temporary assignments in investigatory units.



Detective Timothy Ferrari has thirty-four years with the department and over twenty-three years of experience as a Detective in the Criminal Investigation Division. Detective Ferrari's extensive investigatory experience has led to him mentoring the next generation of CID Detectives.



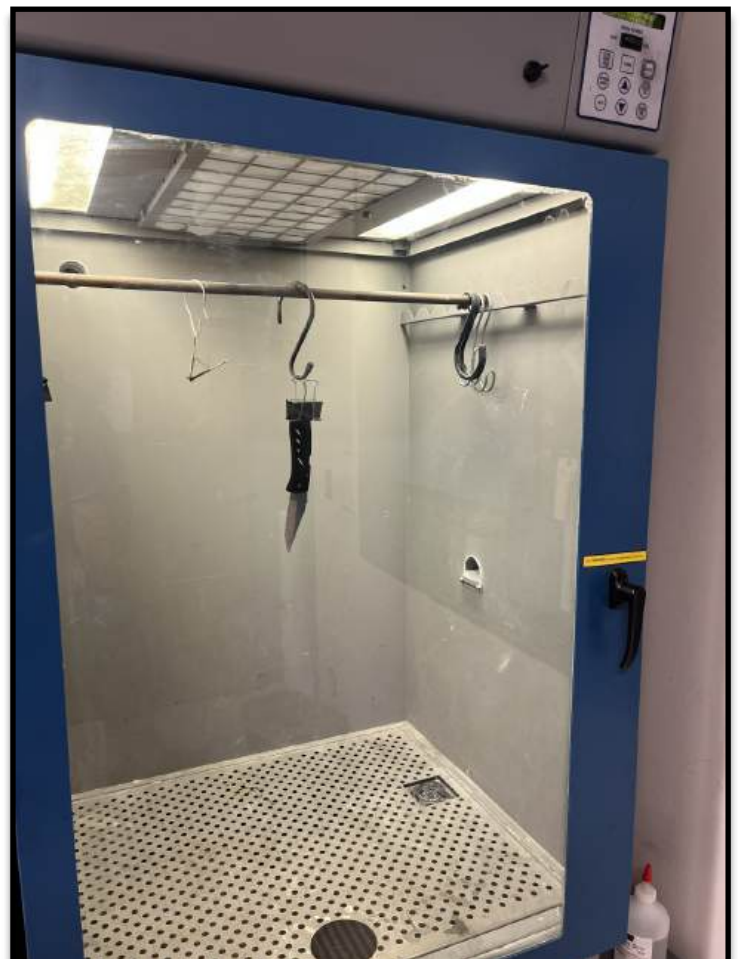
IDENTIFICATION UNIT

Detective Hazard utilizes specialized techniques and equipment to process evidence seized from crime scenes.



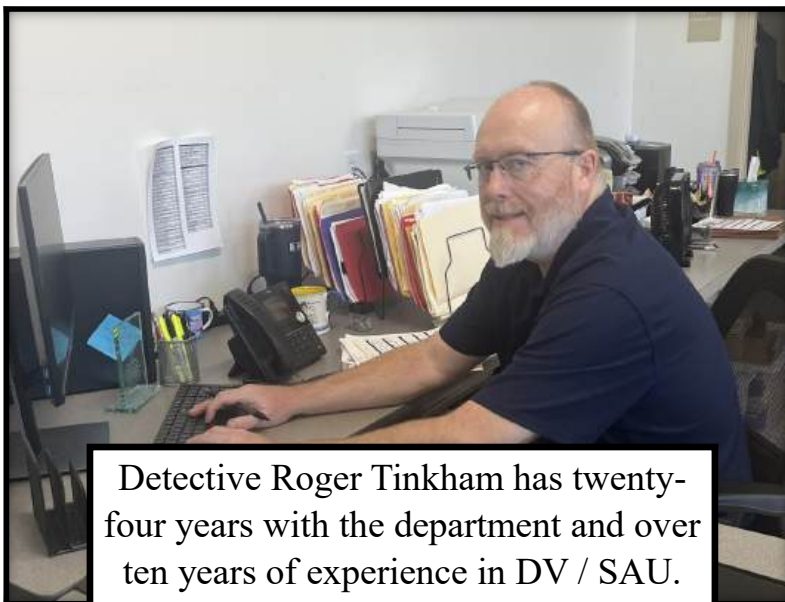


DOMESTIC VIOLENCE / SEXUAL ASSAULT UNIT

The Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault Unit (DVU/SAU) is responsible for investigating cases involving domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse, cybercrimes related to child pornography, and crimes against elderly and disabled individuals. The unit plays a critical role not only in the investigation of these offenses, but also in supporting the prosecution process long after the initial investigation has concluded. Investigative responsibilities frequently include the execution of search warrants, collection and logging of evidence, witness interviews, and participation in forensic interviews. Detectives assigned to the unit work closely with prosecutors and victim /witness advocates from the Essex County District Attorney's Office at both the District and Superior Court levels.

DVU / SAU is supervised by Lieutenant Kelly Tucker, who has served with the Lynn Police Department for twenty years and assumed command of the unit in 2020.

Lieutenant Tucker oversees Detectives Roger Tinkham and Giovanna Lorenzet, who collectively manage hundreds of investigations each month. All detectives assigned to the unit receive specialized training focused on assisting victims and addressing the unique challenges associated with these sensitive investigations.



Detective Roger Tinkham has twenty-four years with the department and over ten years of experience in DV / SAU.

Detective Giovanna Lorenzet has over four years with the department and just under two years assigned to DV / SAU. Det. Lorenzet's specialized training and bilingual skills are invaluable while she works through complex investigations.



YOUTH SERVICES UNIT



The Youth Services Unit is comprised of the Juvenile Unit, School Resource Officers, the School Security Liaison, and the Gang Unit. The unit is dedicated to supporting youth within the community through enforcement, prevention, intervention, and outreach initiatives. YSU has partnered with organizations such as LYSOA and R.O.C.A. in ongoing efforts to reduce juvenile crime and provide positive opportunities for at-risk youth. The YSU also works with the Lynn Community Health Center on the Adverse Childhood Experiences Response Team (ACERT) to assist children and families who have experienced traumatic events.

Lieutenant Thomas Holland, a twenty-three year veteran of the department, assumed command of the Youth Services Unit (YSU) in early 2024. Lieutenant Holland brings extensive experience to the position, having previously served as a supervisor on the Patrol Division and the Traffic Unit.

YSU also serves as the department's primary liaison to the school department, maintaining a strong and collaborative relationship with school administrators and staff. In partnership with other community agencies, the unit helps coordinate the Teen Center program, which is funded through the Shannon Grant and provides juveniles with a safe and supervised environment on weekend evenings. Since its inception, the Teen Center has positively impacted thousands of youth throughout the City of Lynn.

In addition, during school vacation periods the Youth Services Unit played a key role in organizing Youth Drop-In Centers at Thurgood and Breed Middle Schools, offering structured activities and safe spaces for students during school breaks. Lieutenant Holland also coordinates the Lynn Police Student Academy each summer, as well as the department's annual Bike Safety Day and our very popular Splash Pad events; all of which are designed to strengthen relationships between law enforcement and the community's youth while promoting education and safety.



YOUTH SERVICES UNIT



Detective Jeffrey Trahant has been with the department for twenty years. Detective Trahant is assigned as the Juvenile Detective in the Youth Services Unit. He investigates a range of crimes involving juveniles. He also serves as the primary liaison to the ACERT program.

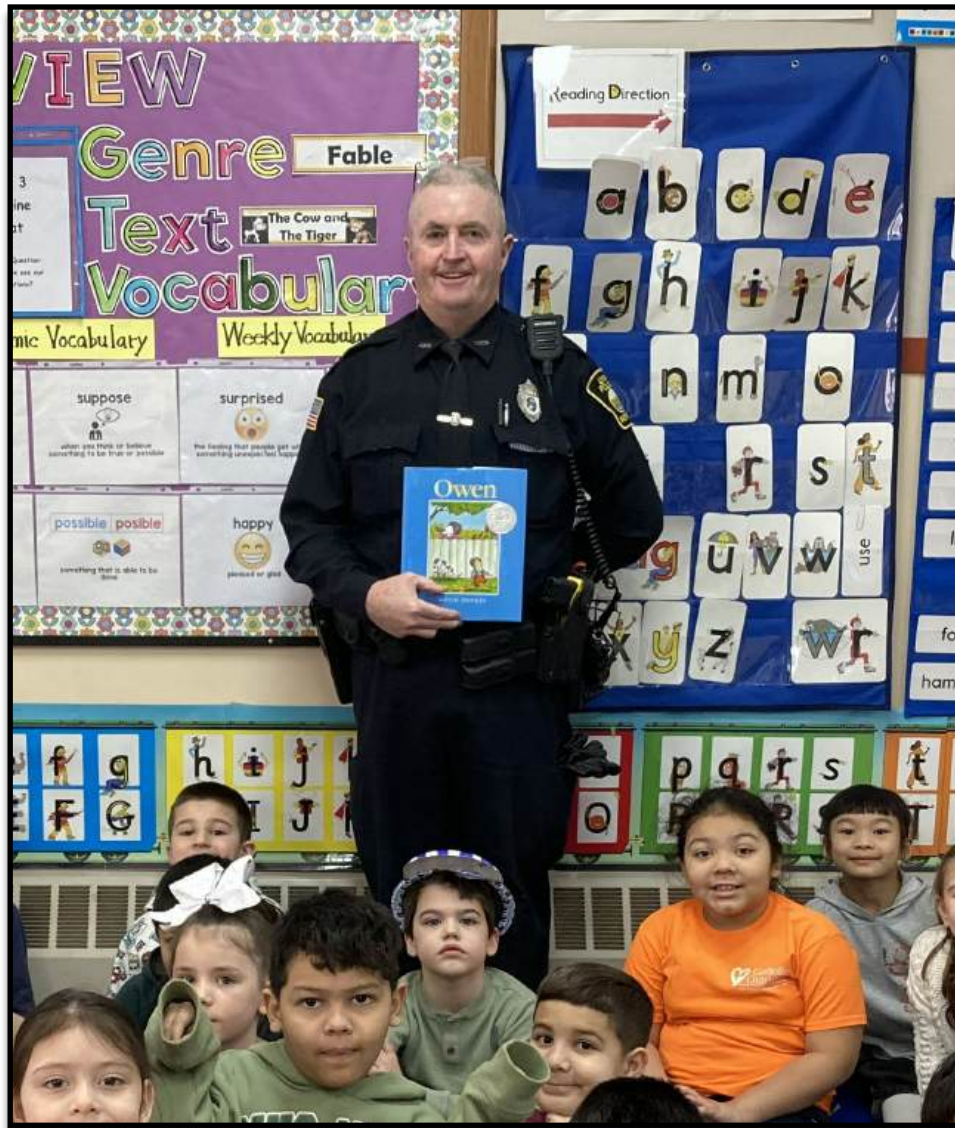

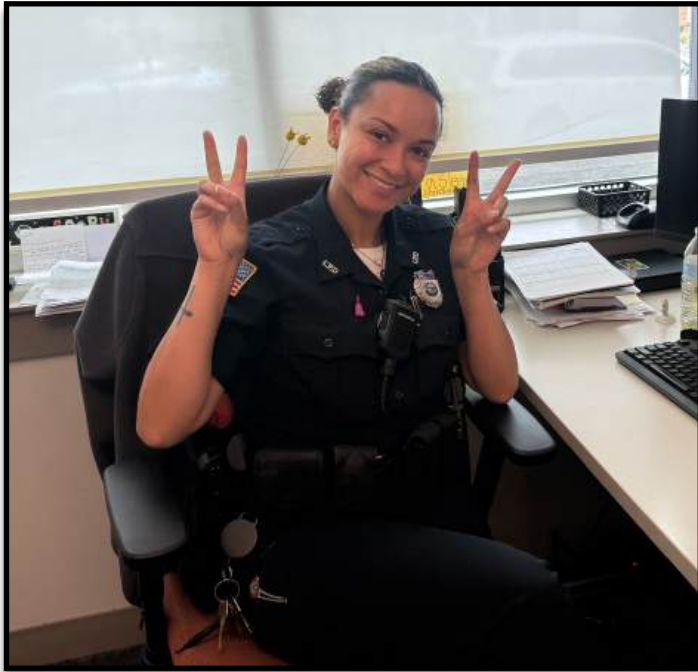
School Resource Officer McDermott joined the department in 2005 and he is currently assigned to Lynn English High School.

GANG UNIT

The primary mission of the **Gang Unit** is the suppression and prevention of gang-related criminal activity throughout the city. Proactive patrol operations and thorough criminal investigations continue to be the foundation of the unit's efforts. The unit works closely with the Patrol Division, providing support and assistance whenever needed, while also partnering with the Drug Task Force to coordinate joint investigations.

The Gang Unit also collaborates with outside law enforcement agencies through its partnership with the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and participation in the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (H.I.D.T.A.) initiative, enhancing regional intelligence sharing and investigative coordination.

Detective Christopher Hagerty and Detective John Bernard report directly to Sergeant Gary Hagerty, who joined the department in 1999 and brings valuable supervisory experience from the Patrol Division and years of experience investigating gang-related crime. Detective Christopher Hagerty has thirty years of law enforcement experience and has long been recognized as an exceptional street officer.

Detective John Bernard joined the Gang Unit in 2021. A veteran of more than fifteen years with the department, Detective Bernard had previously been temporarily assigned to the unit, giving him valuable investigative experience prior to his permanent assignment.





DRUG TASK FORCE

The **Lynn Drug Task Force** is responsible for investigating and disrupting illegal drug activity throughout the City of Lynn. Members conduct investigations involving the distribution of controlled substances, drug trafficking organizations, overdose-related activity, and other crimes associated with the illegal drug trade. Task Force officers identify and target individuals and organizations involved in drug distribution, gather intelligence, conduct surveillance, execute search warrants, and work with prosecutors to develop cases for criminal enforcement. The Drug Task Force works closely with the Essex County District Attorney's Office, Massachusetts State Police, federal partners, and other local law enforcement agencies to address drug-related activity and emerging trends. One Task Force officer is assigned to a regional task force with the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), allowing for collaboration on larger-scale investigations and regional drug issues that impact the City of Lynn. Through intelligence-led investigations, coordinated enforcement efforts, and partnerships with public safety and community stakeholders, the Lynn Drug Task Force works to reduce the availability of illegal drugs, disrupt criminal activity, and improve safety for Lynn residents.

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS DIVISION



The Professional Standards Division is commanded by Captain William Sharpe, who reports directly to Deputy Chief Michael Vail. Captain Sharpe has served with the department for more than twenty-eight years and previously led the Training Unit for many years, bringing extensive experience and institutional knowledge to his current role. Captain Sharpe oversees several critical functions within the department, including the Training Unit, Internal Affairs/Public Information, Court Unit, and Evidence Unit.

In addition to his supervisory responsibilities, Captain Sharpe plays a key role in securing federal and state grant funding for the department through the preparation and management of grant applications. Captain Sharpe is also responsible for overseeing the department's police recruit hiring process. His duties include coordinating

comprehensive background investigations for prospective candidates, arranging drug screenings, oral board interviews, psychological evaluations, and physical examinations prior to candidates entering the police academy.

Internal Affairs / Public Information

Lieutenant Rick Connick has 14 years with the department and he is currently assigned as the Internal Affairs Investigator and Public Information Officer. Lt. Connick conducts investigations into complaints made against officers, manages media inquiries, writes Press Releases, manages our social media accounts and leads our recruitment program.

He is additionally tasked with overseeing the development of our new website, expanding our social media presence and developing our hybrid hiring process for new officers.





TRAINING UNIT



The **Training Unit** is currently under the direction of Lieutenant Mark Duran, an eleven year veteran of the department. The Training Unit is responsible for ensuring that all officers remain current with state-mandated annual training requirements, including legal updates, defensive tactics, firearms qualifications, and First Responder training.

The unit follows the curriculum established by the Municipal Police Training Council and coordinates all in-service training programs for department personnel. In addition to mandatory annual training, Lieutenant Duran also oversees specialized 911 dispatcher training for officers assigned to the signal room, ensuring they maintain the certifications required to answer emergency 911 calls.

Detective Gregory Brotherton has been with the department for twenty years and he is currently assigned to the Training Unit. As our Training Coordinator, Detective Brotherton is responsible for our adherence to MPTC required in-service requirements, records management for Naloxone, AED use and Taser deployments. Additionally, he is a Firearms Instructor, Taser Instructor, Handgun Armorer, Patrol Rifle Armorer, VirTra Training Instructor and our Designated Infectious Control Officer.





EVIDENCE UNIT



Lieutenant Ashley Affonco serves as the officer in charge of the **Evidence Unit**. An eighteen-year veteran of the department, Lieutenant Affonco oversaw the implementation of the Body Worn Camera (BWC) program.

The Evidence Unit is responsible for managing and processing hundreds of video evidence requests each year. While the majority of these requests originate from the District Attorney's Office, the unit also responds to requests from other agencies and entities. Body-worn camera footage provides prosecutors with critical evidence that is often instrumental in the successful prosecution of criminal cases.

Detective Jessica Seaman has been with the department for twelve years and she is currently assigned as the Evidence Control Officer. Det. Seaman categorizes incoming evidence, manages our Evidence Control Room and manages prisoner property.





EVIDENCE UNIT

In addition to processing and managing evidence, the Evidence Unit is responsible for training newly hired officers on the proper use of body-worn cameras and the required procedures for categorizing and documenting recorded footage. The unit also assists officers with the department's Signal Sidearm Sensor system, which is integrated with firearm holsters and designed to automatically activate body-worn cameras when an officer's firearm is removed from the holster.



Detective Elvis Rodriguez has been with the department for seven years and he is currently assigned to the Evidence Unit. Det. Rodriguez manages thousands of hours of Video Evidence from Body Worn Cameras and a constant stream of requests for videos, as well as, redactions.



COURT LIAISON



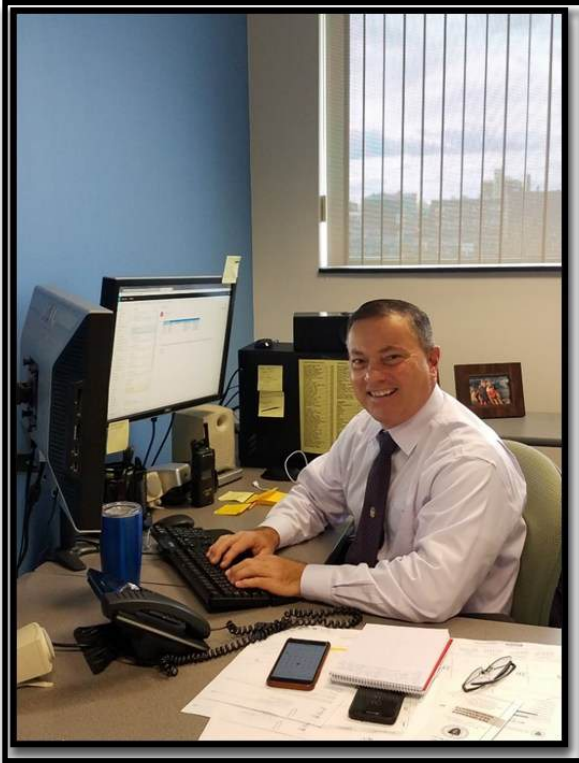
Lieutenant Michael Gorman is the Court Liaison and he oversees the LPD operations in Lynn District Court, as well as, various other local courts that may require our officers' attendance.

Officer Eng Chhor has been with the department for twenty-nine years and he served as the Court Commitment Officer. Ofc. Chhor ensures all of our court paperwork is in compliance and he handles prisoner transports. Officer Chhor retired from the Department in early 2026.





ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION



The Administrative Division, which encompasses the Crime Analysis Unit and Records Department / Firearms Licensing, is commanded by Captain James Flynn. Captain Flynn is a thirty-two year veteran of the department and assumed his current role in 2018.

Captain Flynn's responsibilities include overseeing the department's Records Management System, monitoring crime statistics, and analyzing crime trends and patterns throughout the city. He supervises the Crime Analysis Unit, which supports the efforts of the Patrol Division, as well as, the Criminal Investigation Division in their crime control efforts.

As part of his administrative duties, Captain Flynn reviews all incident reports, accident reports, and booking reports to ensure compliance with both state and federal reporting standards. After review, he approves each report, assigns the appropriate classification code, and submits the information to the State Wide Information Sharing System (SWISS).

Captain Flynn is also responsible for overseeing the department's submission of crime data for the Uniform Crime Report (UCR), which is reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Through these responsibilities, the Administrative Division plays a critical role in maintaining accurate records, supporting intelligence-led policing, and ensuring compliance with statewide and federal reporting requirements.

ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

Crime Analysis Unit



The Crime Analysis Unit, staffed by Rachel Desilets and Daniel Casey, is responsible for collecting, reviewing, and analyzing crime data to identify trends, patterns, and emerging public safety concerns within the community. The unit supports police operations by providing timely intelligence and statistical analysis that assists in crime prevention, resource deployment, and investigative efforts. Crime analysts work closely with patrol officers, detectives, and command staff to identify repeat offenders, crime hotspots, and patterns of criminal activity, helping the department make informed operational and strategic decisions.



ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISION

Records Department

Lieutenant Robert Avery is a twenty-three year veteran of the department and serves as the department's official "Keeper of the Records." He is responsible for overseeing the daily operations of the Records Department, which serves as the central repository for all records maintained by the Lynn Police Department. Lieutenant Avery supervises the civilian staff assigned to the Records Department, who collectively process and manage thousands of reports generated by the department each year.

In addition to overseeing records management, Lieutenant Avery is responsible for registering all Level II and Level III sex offenders residing within the City of Lynn. The Records Department conducts address verifications for registered sex offenders twice annually, exceeding the state requirement of once per year. The department has received recognition from the Commonwealth for its efforts and diligence in this area. Information regarding Level III sex offenders registered with the department is available through the department's website.

Lieutenant Avery also manages the processing of all firearm license applications submitted within the City of Lynn. The department utilizes the Massachusetts Instant Records Check System (MIRCS) through the Criminal History Systems Board Firearms Unit to review and process these applications.

Additionally, the Records Department is responsible for handling the administrative processing of all motor vehicle accident reports and citations generated by the department.

Detention Attendants



Jennifer Gridley, Miriam Flores, Urraina Caisse and Zabra Martin make up our team of Detention Attendants. Detention Attendants play a vital role in ensuring the safety, security, and well-being of individuals in police custody. Our Detention Attendants monitor detainees, conduct searches, report concerns, and support departmental procedures in the care and custody of individuals held at the police facility.



SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION



The Support Services Division includes several essential operational functions, including the maintenance of the department's physical facilities, Fleet Operations, the Computer Unit, and the Detail Office. Captain Michael Kmiec is a twenty-four year veteran of the department and he oversees the Support Services Division.

Captain Kmiec's responsibilities include ensuring the proper maintenance and operation of the police station, marked and unmarked police vehicles, and the department's technological and computer systems. He plays a significant role in coordinating and implementing the technological advancements that continue to

modernize and enhance departmental operations.

Reporting directly to Captain Kmiec are Officer Dan Destefano of Fleet Operations, Officer Michael Economou of the Detail Unit and David Perez of the Computer Unit. Together, they support the department's infrastructure, equipment, and technological needs to ensure efficient daily operations and continued service to the community.

Officer Destefano has fifteen years with the department and as a Certified Auto Mechanic, he is assigned to Fleet Operations. Officer Destefano maintains the fleet of over one hundred vehicles and with our operations running 24/7, he ensures we are always prepared to respond.





SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION



Officer Michael Economou has been with the department for twelve years and he is currently assigned as the Detail Officer. He is responsible for coordinating and assigning police officers to outside detail assignments throughout the community. These assignments include construction projects, private businesses, licensed establishments, special events, and private functions.

Officers assigned to details provide an additional level of safety and security for the community. While working these assignments, officers are required to remain in constant communication with dispatch, ensuring that on-duty personnel remain informed of any criminal activity or emergencies occurring within their assigned areas.



David Perez is our Information Technology Coordinator and he has worked with the department for ten years. He ensures all of our computer systems, servers, radio systems and 911 systems are operating to full potential.



BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

The Lynn Police Department has both the Behavioral Health Unit, and the Behavioral Health Intervention Program, to help us address substance use, mental health and a range of other issues in the community.

The **Behavioral Health Intervention Program (BHIP)** is a co-response team that responds with LPD in the field to various calls for service. Staffed with a Licensed Clinician, a Recovery Coach and a Paramedic, the BHIP Team has specialized expertise, training and equipment to assist the community on scene. The BHIP Team will co-respond to calls including overdoses, service of Section 12 orders, calls involving a Person in Crisis, Suicidal Persons, Well-Being Checks and Panhandlers. The mission of the program is to enhance the delivery of services for behavioral health and / or co-occurring substance use disorders within the community.



The **Behavioral Health Unit (BHU)** is the department's Jail Diversion Program and is dedicated to assisting individuals experiencing mental health challenges and substance use disorders, while also providing support and resources to their families. The unit works to connect individuals with appropriate treatment providers and community-based services, including behavioral health treatment, substance use recovery programs, harm reduction services, support groups, housing assistance, and other available resources.

The Behavioral Health Unit is staffed by two case managers and a licensed clinician who work closely with patrol officers, community partners, and service providers to address the underlying causes of repeated police contacts. Whenever appropriate, the unit seeks to divert individuals from the criminal justice system by connecting them with the services and support needed to promote long-term stability, improve quality of life, and reduce future interactions with law enforcement.



NEW PROGRAMS

Motorcycle Deployment

In 2025, the Lynn Police Department reinstituted our Motorcycle Program. Highly trained and certified officers will deploy the motorcycles to assist with events, traffic control and to patrol areas of difficult access. The Lynn Police has a long history of utilizing motorcycle patrols for enhanced public safety. This program represents a valuable addition to enhance public safety and community engagement.



Field Training Officer Program

As we are consistently working to improve and develop our officers, in 2025 the Lynn Police Department revamped our Field Training Officer Program. A select group of officers submitted to a comprehensive training program to be Certified Field Training Officers. New officers will now be placed through our enhanced Field Training Program where their progress can be documented, analyzed and their skills can be sharpened to provide the best service possible to our residents.



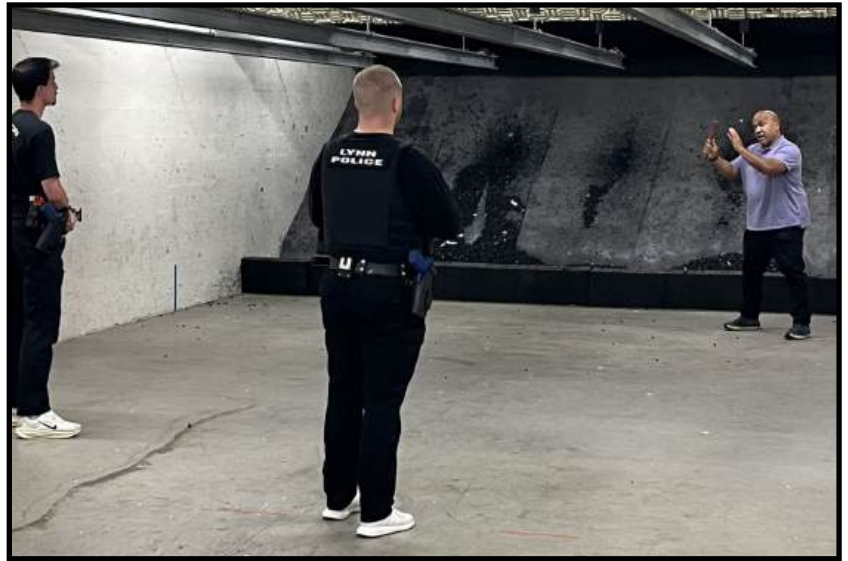


NEW PROGRAMS

ICAT

This year, LPD officers trained in The Integrating Communications, Assessment, and Tactics (ICAT) program. Through a combination of classroom instruction, case studies, and realistic scenario-based exercises, ICAT prepares officers to resolve challenging situations while enhancing safety for both the public and law enforcement personnel. ICAT is an innovative, evidence-based use-of-force training model designed to equip first responding officers with the skills, tools, and strategies necessary to safely and effectively manage critical incidents. Developed by the Police Executive Research Forum (PERF) with input from hundreds of law enforcement professionals across the country, ICAT emphasizes de-escalation, critical thinking, and sound decision-making in dynamic situations.

ICAT is particularly focused on incidents involving individuals experiencing a behavioral health crisis, as well as encounters with unarmed persons or those armed with weapons other than firearms. The training integrates communication techniques, tactical considerations, crisis intervention strategies, and force options into a comprehensive approach to incident management.



NEMLEC

In 2025, the Lynn Police Department joined the Northeastern Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council (NEMLEC). NEMLEC is a consortium of police department across Middlesex and Essex Counties that coordinates the sharing of resources, personnel and expertise among agencies to enhance public safety. NEMLEC maintains specialized teams made up of member



department officers. These team include SWAT, Rapid Response Team, Drone Unit, Motors Unit, K-9 Unit, Mountain Bike Unit and more.



SIGNIFICANT INVESTIGATION

Trinitarios Organized Crime Investigation

The Lynn Police Department remained actively engaged in a long-term, multi-agency investigation targeting the Trinitarios criminal organization operating within the City of Lynn and surrounding communities. This effort was conducted in coordination with the Massachusetts State Police, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), the Essex County District Attorney's Office, and the United States Attorney's Office for the District of Massachusetts.

The investigation centered on a structured and violent criminal enterprise responsible for significant gang-related activity in Lynn, including shootings, homicides, attempted homicides, narcotics trafficking, and coordinated retaliatory violence. Federal charging documents allege that the Lynn-based faction of the organization operated under an internal hierarchy and engaged in repeated acts of violence to maintain influence over territory and enforce gang discipline.

Federal authorities unsealed racketeering (RICO) charges against approximately two dozen members, leaders, and associates of the Trinitarios organization. These charges were the result of a multi-jurisdictional investigation stemming from a series of murders and attempted murders in Lynn and surrounding Essex County communities between 2017 and 2023. The enforcement action included coordinated arrests and indictments across multiple agencies, significantly disrupting the leadership structure of the Lynn-based faction.

Subsequent prosecutions resulted in additional arrests, guilty pleas, and convictions of Lynn-based members involved in racketeering conspiracy, violent assaults, and firearms-related offenses. These cases included admissions of participation in shootings and other violent acts tied directly to the Lynn chapter of the organization, further demonstrating the scope and severity of its criminal activity within the city.

The Lynn Police Department's role in this investigation included local intelligence gathering, patrol-level enforcement support, coordination with federal task force partners, and assistance in identifying patterns of gang-related violence affecting neighborhoods throughout the city. The Lynn Police Department's Criminal Investigation Division, Detective Unit, and Gang Unit devoted countless hours to complex, long-term investigations supporting this case. Their sustained investigative efforts, intelligence gathering, and collaboration with partner agencies were instrumental in identifying key individuals, developing probable cause, and advancing prosecutions targeting organized gang activity in the City of Lynn. These efforts contributed to the disruption of an organized criminal network responsible for prolonged violence and instability in multiple communities.

The continued collaboration between local, state, and federal partners remains critical to addressing transnational and structured gang activity, ensuring accountability for violent offenders, and enhancing public safety throughout the City of Lynn.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The Lynn Police Department actively participates in a wide variety of community events throughout the year, including youth programs, neighborhood gatherings, cultural celebrations, safety initiatives, and charitable activities. These events provide valuable opportunities for officers to interact with residents in a positive and informal setting, helping to build trust, strengthen relationships, and foster open communication. Community engagement is an essential component of modern policing, as it promotes collaboration between the police and the public, enhances public safety, and reinforces the department's commitment to serving the community beyond traditional law enforcement responsibilities.



One of our staple Community Engagement initiatives is the Community Intervention Team Patrols (CIT). CIT Patrols are conducted once a month by all officers assigned to a Special Unit between May and October. The assigned officers don the traditional uniform and patrol on foot in the downtown area. The goal is to increase community engagement and build partnerships in problem solving. During a recent CIT Patrol, while walking in the Commons, Det. Brotherton was drafted by the Boy & Girls Club kids to be their quarterback!

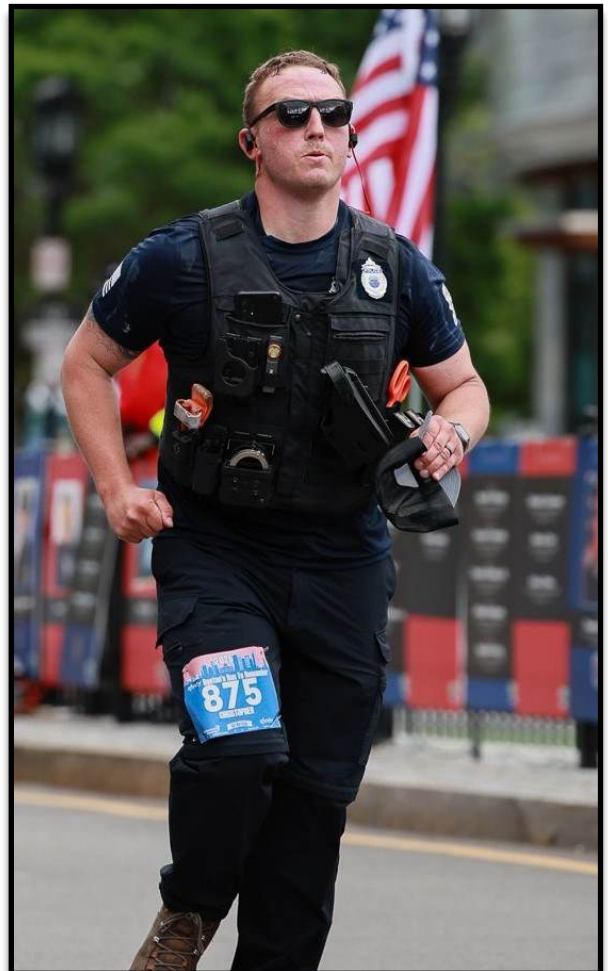

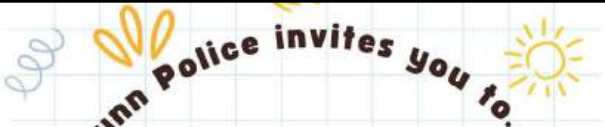

We even added Gym Drop-In at the Middle School gyms during school vacation! Our goal is to provide a safe place for kids to go and recreate while we engage with the youth to foster better relations.



OFFICER OF THE MONTH

The “Officer of the Month” award recognizes the efforts of an individual with the rank of Patrol Officer, from Division or a Special Unit, who has demonstrated exceptional dedication in the performance of his / her duties during the previous month.

The following are the 2025 “Officer of the Month” recipients:



January 2025 – Officer Aedan Leydon

Officer Leydon excelled in a recent sexual assault investigation, guiding the victim and medical staff through the process and helping secure an arrest within 24 hours. That same day, his proactive patrol work with Officer McHale led to the recovery of a handgun, rifle, and ammunition during a stop informed by gang related intelligence.

February 2025 – Officer David Barnard

Officer Barnard consistently demonstrates initiative, making over 20 motor vehicle stops and responding to more than 100 calls in a month, resulting in multiple arrests and complaints. He also provided life-saving care during a triple stabbing near the Multi-Service Center, showing strong composure for a relatively new officer.



March 2025 – Officer Bryan Fresco

Officer Fresco maintains a calm, steady presence while working with the homeless population at the Multi-Service Center. His compassionate approach builds trust, allowing him to coordinate effectively with Behavioral Health Services and mental health partners. He actively seeks opportunities each night to assist vulnerable individuals.



OFFICER OF THE MONTH



May 2025 – Officer Lucas Harris

During a recent homicide, Officer Harris and Officer Correale swiftly located and apprehended both suspects. Their decisive actions brought the incident to an immediate resolution and demonstrated Officer Harris's effectiveness and courage as a street officer.

June 2025 – Officer Diana Frias

Officer Frias is a dependable, hardworking officer known for her positive attitude and willingness to assist with translation both downtown and at the station. She played a key role in several multi-agency operations and received significant praise from the Massachusetts State Police for her contributions.



July 2025 – Officer Lashaunda Hogan

Officer Hogan showed exceptional patience and empathy while assisting a runaway juvenile who was reluctant to speak with police. She spent five hours advocating for the youth and remained with her until DCF arrived, demonstrating remarkable maturity and compassion for a new officer.



OFFICER OF THE MONTH



August 2025 – Officer Connor McHale

Officer McHale is a reliable First Division officer who frequently assists with fleet issues and responds to major incidents, including shootings and homicides where he has rendered medical aid. He regularly volunteers for traffic grants and supports fellow officers even when not required to do so.

September 2025 – Officer Michael Terry

Despite having less than a year on the job, Officer Terry has become an active, knowledgeable patrol officer in West Lynn and Downtown. In August alone, he made 16 arrests and issued 36 citations, demonstrating strong initiative and strong knowledge of motor vehicle law and enforcement practices.



October 2025 – Officer Travis Fleuriel

As a Field Training Officer during a recent homicide, Officer Fleuriel remained calm while taking the suspect into custody and directing the initial scene response. He ensured the suspect was properly mirandized and used the moment to guide his trainee, showing strong leadership under pressure.



OFFICER OF THE MONTH



November 2025 – Officer Jose Torres

Officer Torres' strong command presence and communication skills have repeatedly deescalated dangerous situations. In one notable incident, he safely controlled two knife wielding individuals fighting at the shelter, resolving a potentially deadly encounter without injury.

December 2025 – Officer Chandler Laguerre

During a trespassing call that escalated into an assault on an employee, Officer Laguerre—working alone—took decisive action, subdued the aggressive subject, and maintained control until backup arrived. His response prevented further harm in a high risk situation.





COMMENDATIONS

A Lynn Police Commendation is an official recognition awarded to officers for acts of bravery, exceptional service or outstanding performance in the line of duty. These acts often go above and beyond the call of duty and can include acts of heroism, lifesaving efforts or significant contributions to the community. In 2025, the following officers were commended:

- January 10, 2025 – **Officer Jacob Hodgdon, Officer Johan Marcalles, Officer Travis Fleuriel, Officer Brandon Devin, Officer Christopher Sanjurjo and Officer David Barnard** received commendations for their immediate response and life-saving intervention on behalf of several victims who had suffered multiple stab wounds during a violent attack on October 6, 2024.
- January 31, 2025 – **Sergeant David Spelta and Officer Travis Fleuriel** received commendations for their immediate response and professional intervention on behalf of an individual who was armed with a knife and threatening suicide on June 1, 2024.
- April 17, 2025 – **Officer Benjamin Craven and Officer Daniel Keough** received commendations for providing immediate, high-quality, and life-saving treatment to the victim of a stabbing, as well as for offering critical investigative support under tense and challenging circumstances on November 10, 2024.
- June 6, 2025 – **Officer Andrew Kreamer, Officer Nicholas Bona and Officer Christopher Kelly** received commendations for their immediate response, strong tactics, and heroic actions during an armed home invasion that occurred on September 30, 2024.
- July 14, 2025 – **Officer Quinn Brinkler, Officer Cody Sutherland, Officer Matthew Lauria, Officer Thomas Cash, Detective John Bernard, and Sergeant Gary Hagerty** received commendations for their keen observations and heroic actions led to the arrest of two-armed gang members and the recovery of multiple illegal firearms on March 26, 2025.
- July 31, 2025 – **Officer Robert Correale and Officer Lucas Harris** received commendations for their immediate response and heroic actions, which resulted in the arrest of two dangerous suspects and the recovery of a firearm following a shooting incident on April 10, 2025.
- September 30, 2025 – **Detective Chris Hagerty, Officer Andrew Kreamer, and Officer Nicholas Bona** received commendations for their keen observations, effective communication, and sound tactics, which led to the arrest of an armed suspect and the seizure of a loaded, untraceable semi-automatic ghost gun on June 15, 2025.
- October 16, 2025 – **Sergeant Ralph Sirois, Sergeant Michael Pennell and Officer Belsar Gonzalez** received commendations for their quick response, tactical decision-making, and coordinated efforts which led to the safe apprehension of an armed and dangerous felon on February 26, 2025.
- October 17, 2025 – **Officer Jose Torres** received a commendation for his immediate response, strong tactics and courageous actions during a dangerous incident involving two armed individuals on July 11, 2025.



COMMENDATIONS—MEDAL OF HONOR



The Medal of Honor is the highest award presented by the Lynn Police Relief Association on behalf of the Lynn Police Department. The Medal of Honor recognizes an officer as a standard of excellence who encompasses character, commitment, integrity and performance during the course of their duties as a police officer and as a member of the community.

The recipient of the 2025 Medal of Honor is Lieutenant Timothy Donovan.



SECTORS

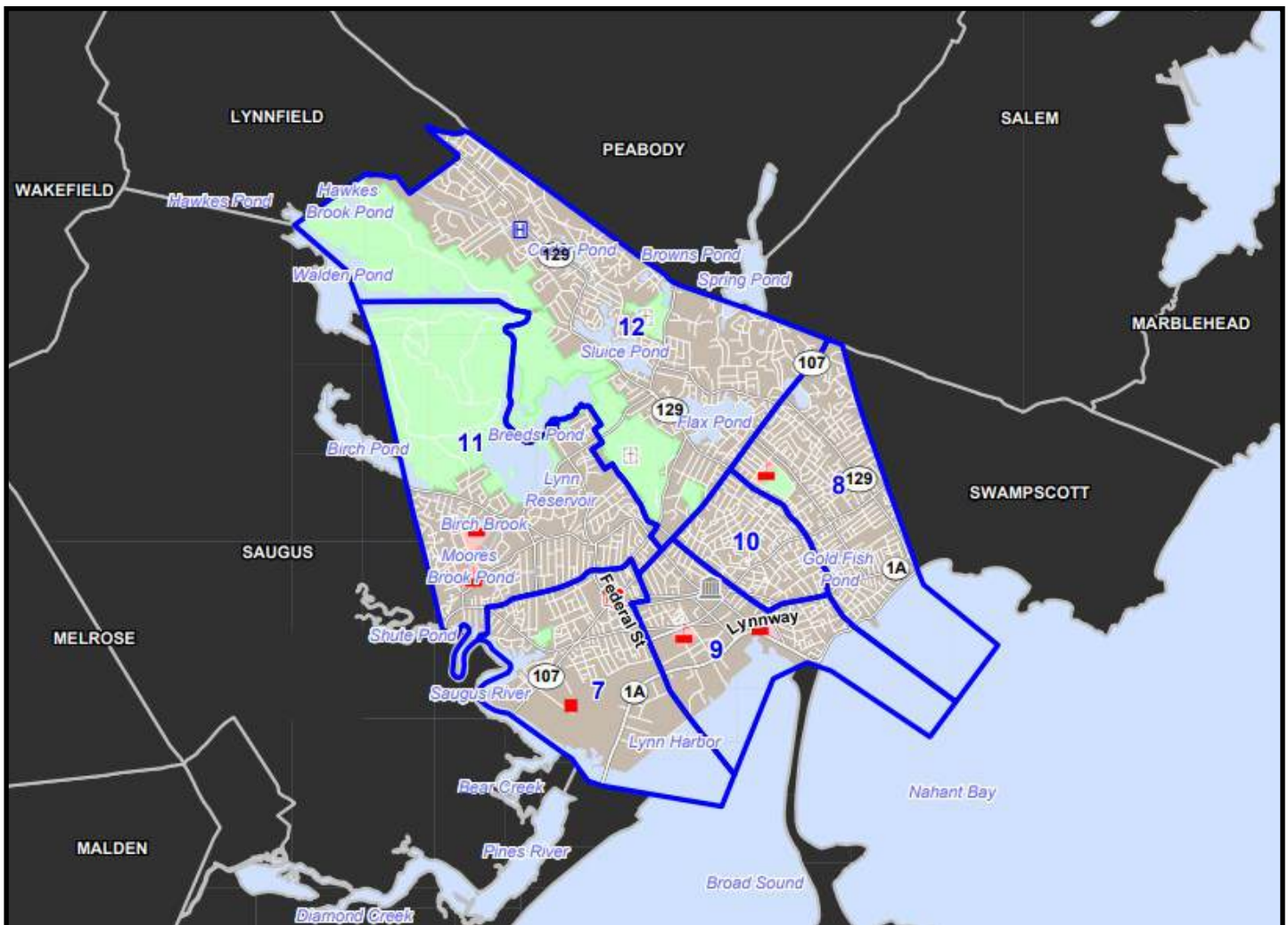

Sectors 9 & 10 = Downtown Route





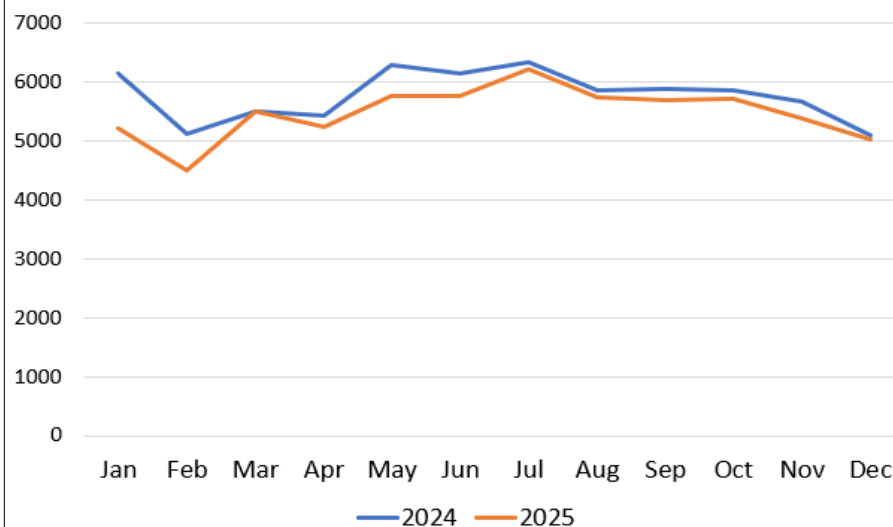

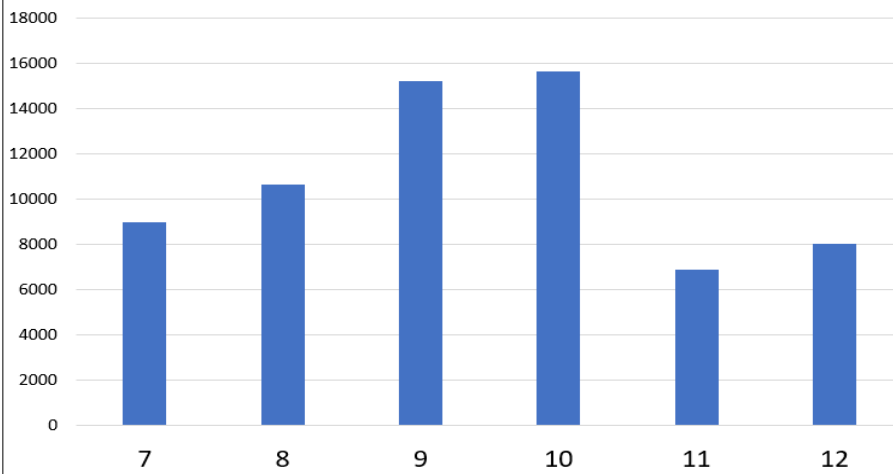

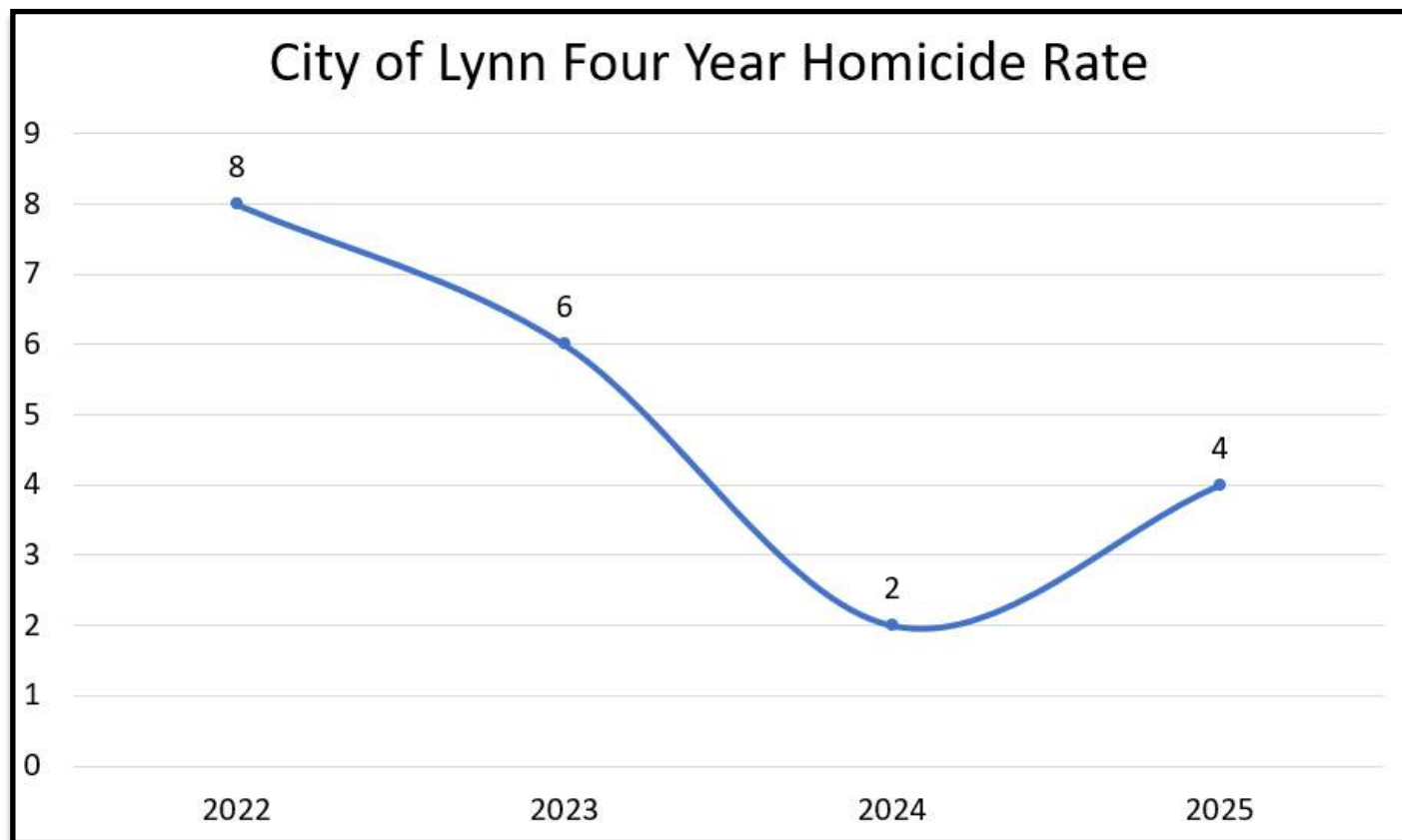

In 2025 there were 44 Robberies reported, which reflects a 53% decrease compared to 2022 (n=94).

Of the 44 Robberies, 5 were commercial robberies and 39 were street robberies.

Thirty percent of Robberies were unarmed with force. Twenty-five percent of the Robberies were unarmed with no force followed by twenty three being armed with a knife. Finally, eleven percent of both Robberies were with a firearm or other weapon/unknown.

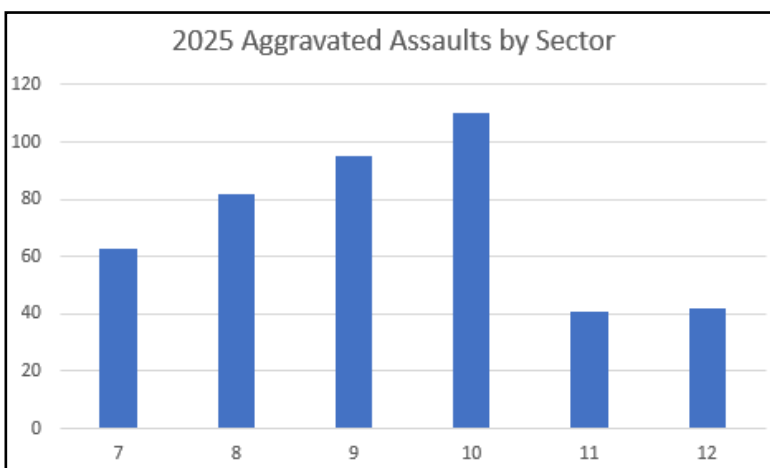
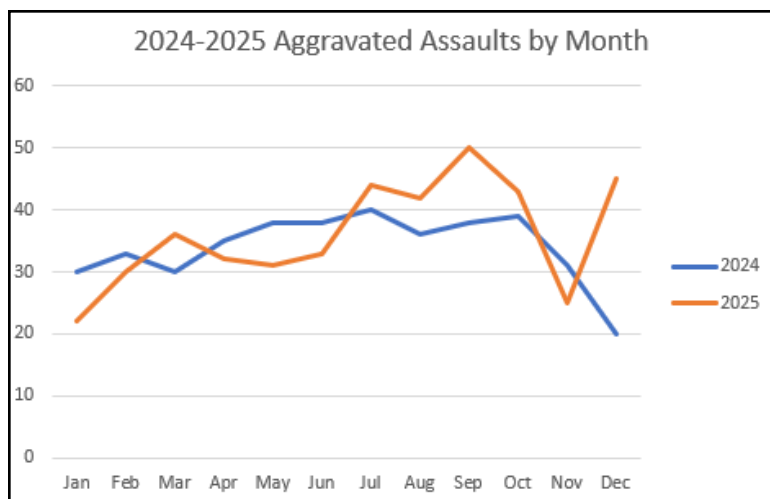
In 2025, there were a total of 433 Aggravated Assaults; an increase of 6% when compared to 2024 (n=411).

Of the 433 Aggravated Assaults, 50% (n=216) were non-domestic related, and 50% (n=217) were domestic related.

Aggravated Assaults in 2025 occurred most frequently in September (n=50), December (n=45), and July (n=44).

Aggravated Assault incidents primarily took place in Sector 10 (n=110) and Sector 9 (n=95), followed by Sector 8 (n=82).

Aggravated Assaults were primarily committed using a Knife/Cutting Instrument (20%), followed by other (17%) and blunt object (14%).

In 2025, the City of Lynn reported a total of 104 Burglaries, which was a 28% decrease compared to 2024 (n=144).

Burglary rates stayed steady through 2025, with the lowest in June and January. The highest months for Burglaries were July (n=15), May (n=12), December (n=11) and September (n=10).

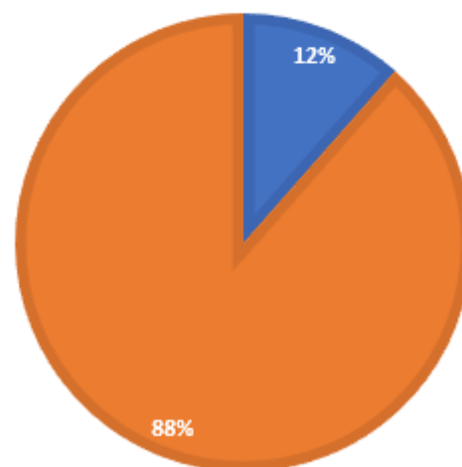
Incidents were reported most frequently on Wednesday (n=20), followed by Thursday (n=19), Sunday (n=19), and Monday (n=15).

Eighty-eight percent of the reported Burglaries were Residential (n=92), 12% were Commercial (n=12). Commercial Burglaries decreased by 59% in 2025 compared to 2024.

Of all the Burglaries reported, 64% were forcible entries (n=67), and 36% were non-forcible entries (n=37).

2025 BURGLARY LOCATION TYPE

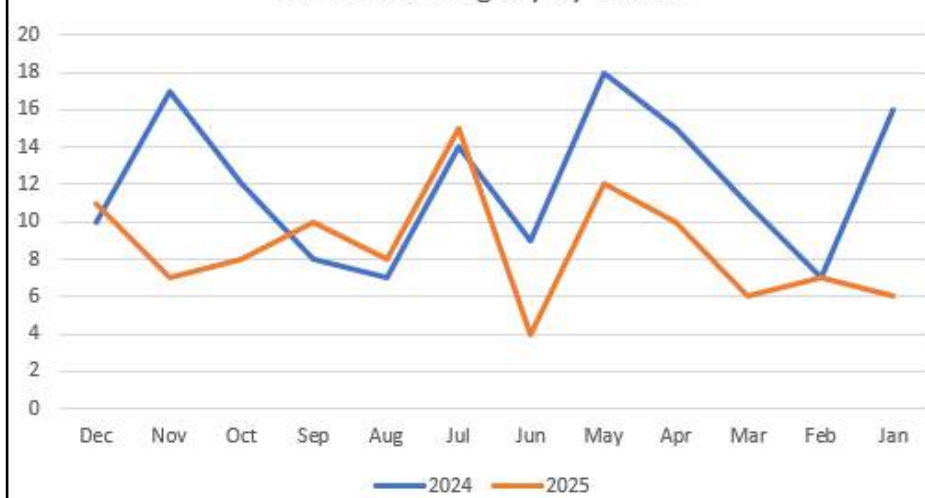

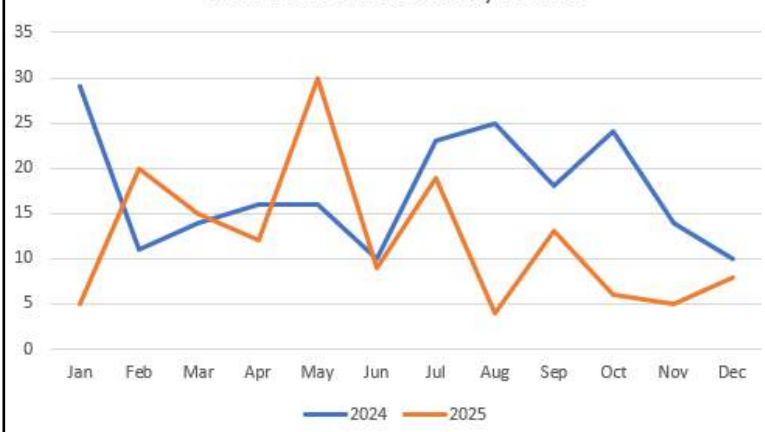
In 2025, there were 146 incidents of Car Breaks reported in the City of Lynn.

Car breaks saw increased numbers from February to May with a drop in June. There was then an increase in July with numbers falling from October to December. May had the most car breaks with 30.

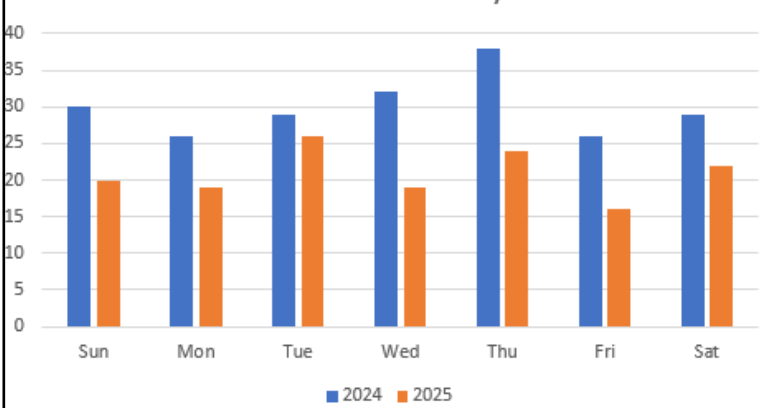
Tuesday reported the highest number of Car Breaks with 18%, followed by Thursday with 16% and Sunday with 15%.

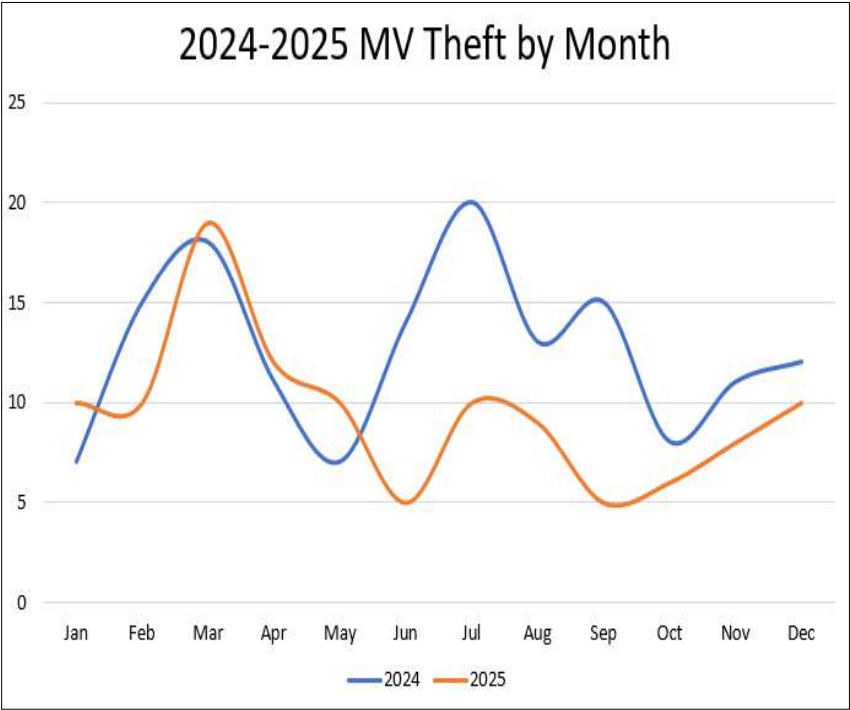
In 2025, the City of Lynn had a total of 114 Motor Vehicle Thefts reported. This number reflects a 33% decrease compared to 2023 (n=171).

MV thefts were higher in the spring months of March and April. Both July and September had a decrease of 10 thefts compared to 2024.

MV thefts primarily took place on Thursday (n=24), Monday (n=23) and Tuesday (n=21).

The top makes of MV thefts were Toyota (n=20), followed by Honda (n=18), Hyundai (n=9) and Chevrolet (n=8)

Sixty-one percent of the stolen vehicles were reported as recovered locally.

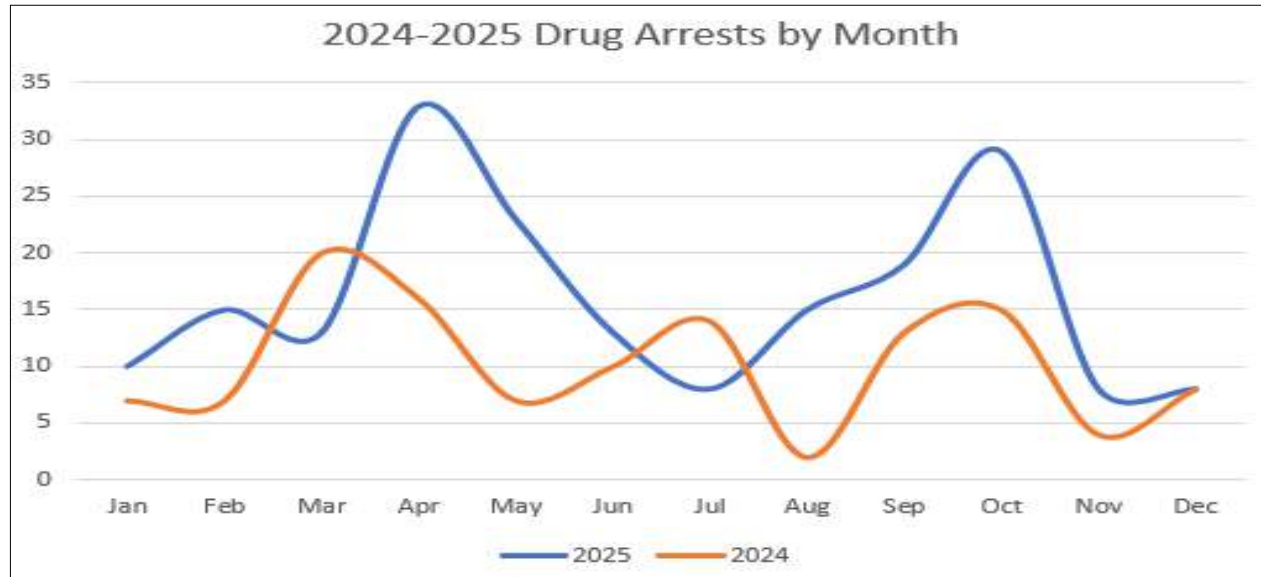

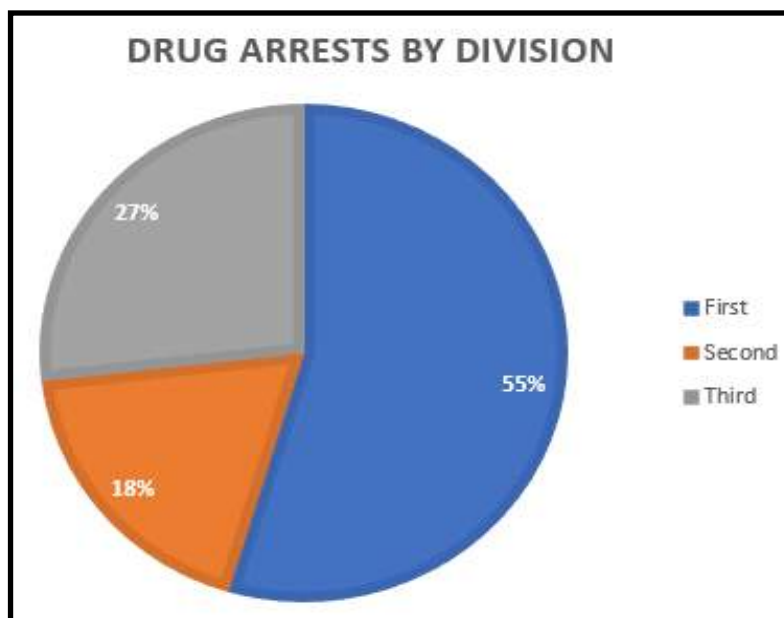


DRUG ARRESTS *CONTINUED*

Drug arrests averaged 16 per month, with April (n=33), Oct (n=29), and May (n=23) having the most. November and December had the least, both with 8.



55% of drug arrests occurred during the First Division, 27% occurred during the Third Division, and 18% occurred during the Second Division.

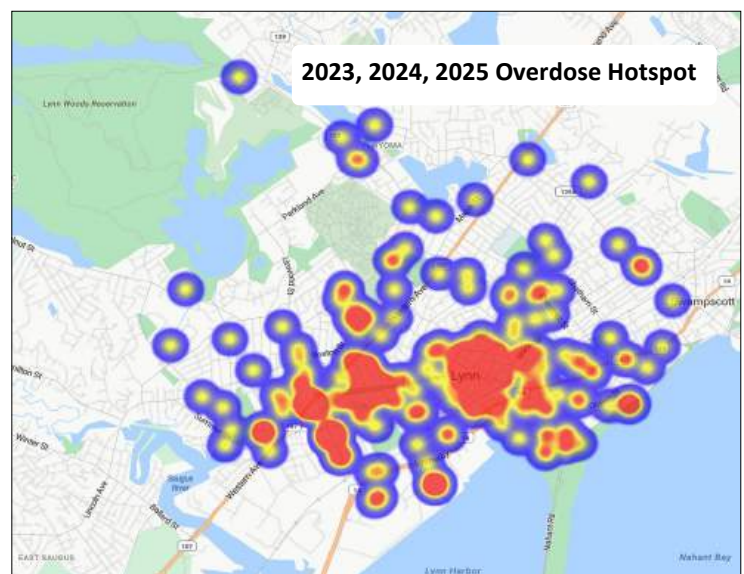
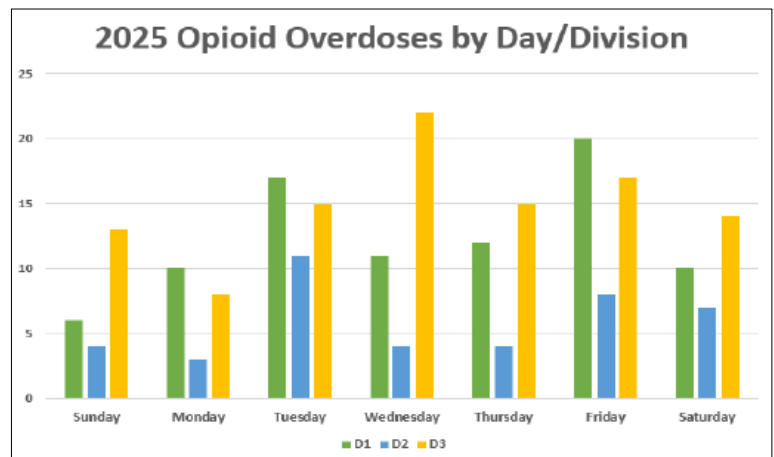
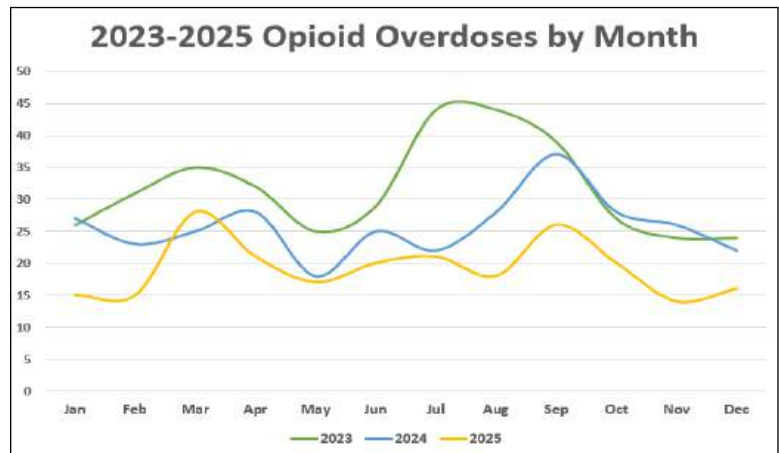

In 2025, the LPD responded to 211 non-fatal opioid overdoses, a decrease of 13% (n=33) compared to 2024 (n=264), and a 32% decrease compared to 2023(n=341).

Thirty-three people involved in the 211 non-fatal opioid overdose incidents overdosed more than once in 2025. That is approximately 16% of all Non-Fatal incidents.

The majority of individuals who overdosed resided in Lynn at 72% (n=167). Outside of Lynn, the highest number of individuals resided in Revere (n=10), Salem (n=6), Saugus (n=6), and Peabody (n=6).

Approximately 45% of the non-fatal opioid overdoses took place on Third Division, followed by First Division at 37% and Second Division at 18%. Incidents primarily occurred on Fridays (n=45) and Tuesdays (n=43).

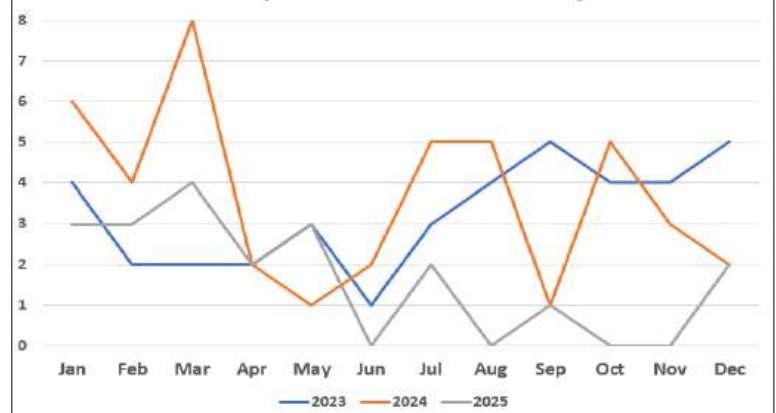
In 2025, there were a total of 20 Sudden Deaths attributed to an Opioid Overdose. This statistic reflects a 55% decrease compared to 2024 (n=44), and a 49% decrease compared to 2023 (n=39)

Most of the Opioid related Sudden Deaths occurred in March (n=4), followed by January, February, and May with 3. These four months accounted for 65% of the Opioid related Sudden Deaths (n=13). All other months had between 1 and 2 Opioid related Sudden Deaths.

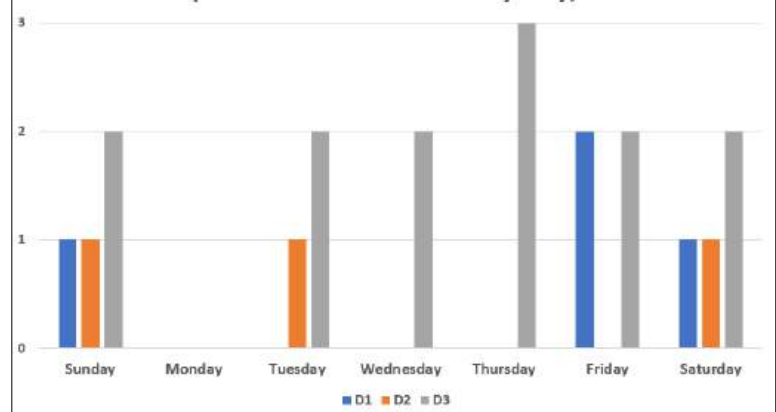
Most Opioid Overdose deaths were reported during Third Division (n=13), followed by First Division (n=4) and Second Division (n=3). Overdose deaths were the highest on Sundays (n=4), Fridays (n=4), and Saturdays (n=4).

Most of the decedents were male (80%); the mean age was 52 years. Thirty-five percent of the decedents were between 50 and 59 years of age. Only 20% were 60 years of age or older. The youngest was 26 and the oldest was 73 years of age.

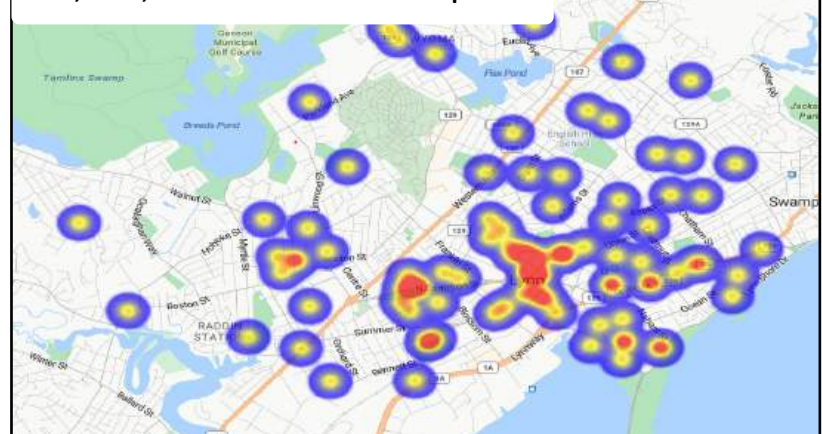
2023-2025 Opioid Overdose Deaths by Month

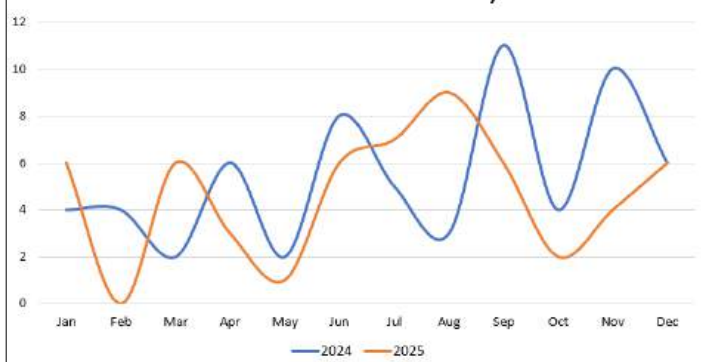
Juvenile arrests decreased 31% over the 3-year period.

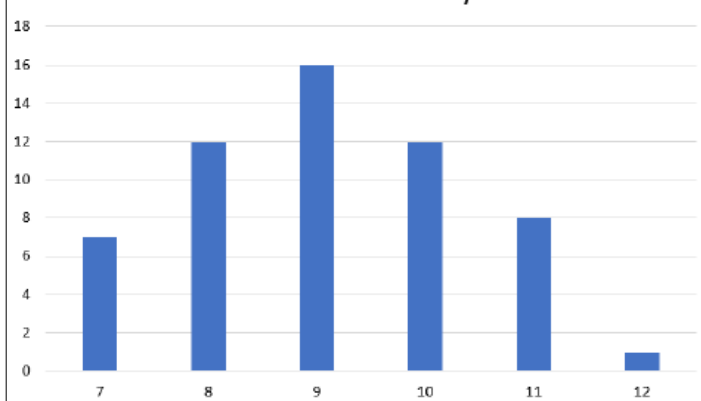

2025 Juvenile Arrests by Sector

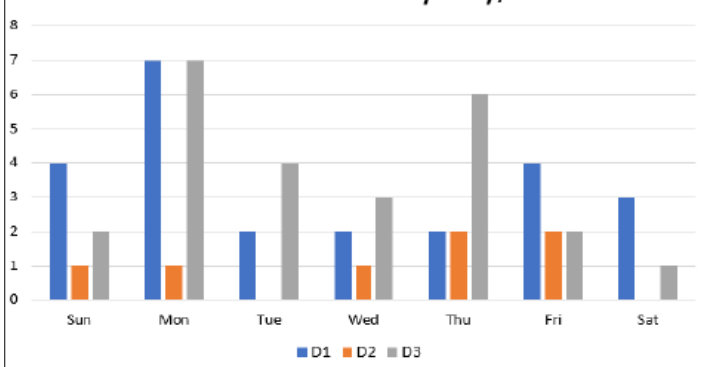

Lynn Police Department officers recovered 33 firearms in 2025 in 26 incidents.

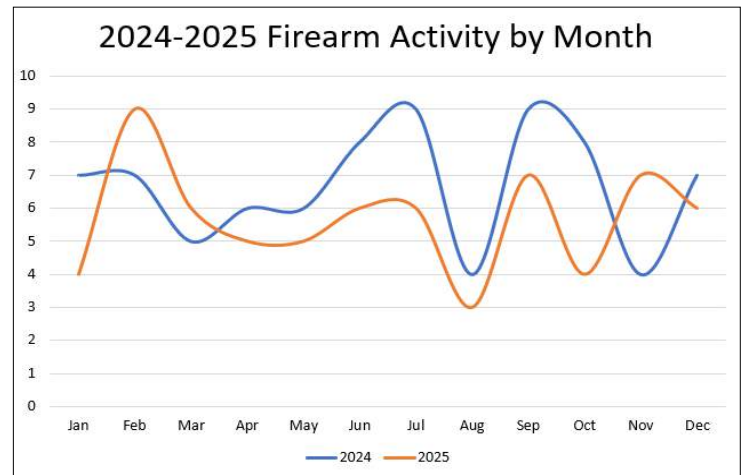

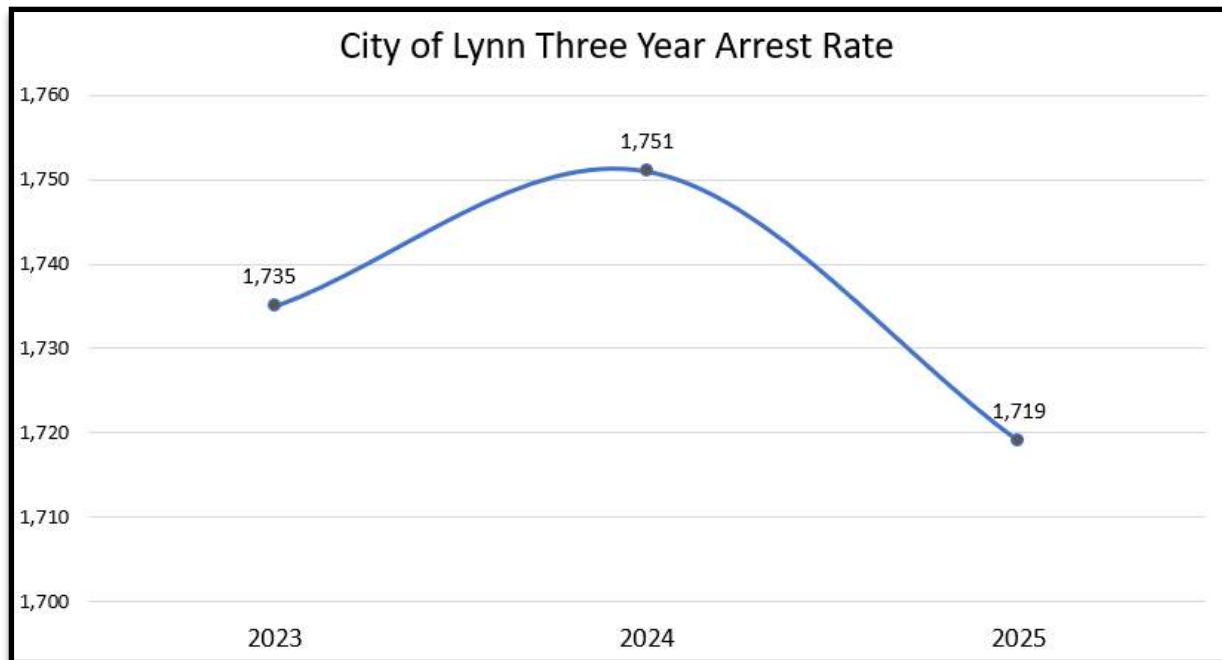
